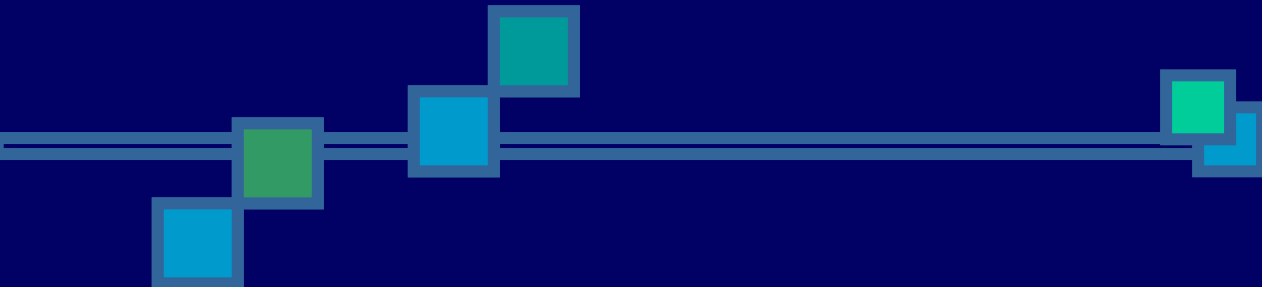


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Necessity for immediate action

- Existing elaborated strategies – basis for implementation (Croatia in 21st Century, E-Croatia)
- Initiatives undertaken by the Ministry of Science and Technology (Virtual University), CARNet projects, various pilot projects...
- Still no adequate actions undertaken by the relevant institution managements



EU and Croatia – virtual neighbours or partners?

- European Union – recognition of and dealing with virtualisation of education space, leads to strategies, endorsed by implementation schemes through projects and investments
 - The results and the products of virtual education – determine and define the new economy and industrial capacity
 - Croatian implementation lacks organisation and support from all relevant factors (budgetary and capital investments, inputs from the entrepreneurial and private sector)
 - How can the pace of Croatian development be continued?
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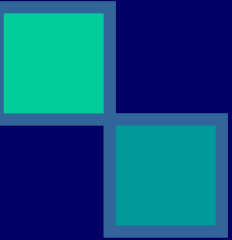



Achieving the actual decision-making “shift”

- To open the academic rigidity in Croatian education arena to new incentives, including enhancement of contents through application in virtual media
- To bring together academic and political decision makers on an expert, open-minded and creative understanding

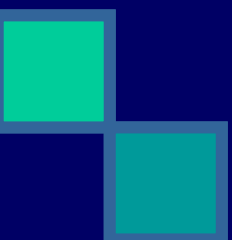



Risks of inactive approach

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- Neighbours that are recognising and seizing the opportunities in the region ([UNIADRION virtual university](#))
 - Croatian participants in European projects – individual experts, not institutions
 - Not taking into consideration the achievements and standards of Europeisation and internationalisation – further knowledge institutional isolation
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Examples of good institutional practice

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- ACA (Academic Cooperation Association) with staff of 8 leads and organises gatherings, research and publishes about topics such as “virtual mobility and cooperation”
 - EAIE (European Association for International Education)
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Advantages of encouraging virtual education activities

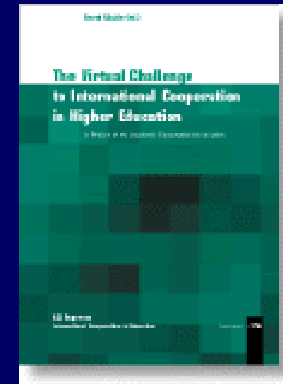
- Presence in the virtual education community – recognition and credit
 - Avoiding “brain-drain” symptoms – more proper HR management
 - Enabling a healthier and more competitive market in Croatia
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Some actual operational suggestions

- Forming “ad hoc” task force groups at universities with the goal to provide institutional framework and planning
 - Using existing IT HR to develop the ideas of virtual education in concrete areas (i.ex. CARNet, IT department staff...)
 - To provide all university subsidiaries with necessary know-how
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Recommendations



- No need to explore the already tested (substantial literature, publications, websites, research results...)
- Teachers are today generally facilitators, not Masters, a lot of incentives being realised depends on the good will of decision-makers



Concluding remarks

- The future of Croatia depends on how Croatians will utilise the existing European and international experiences of IT for their benefit
 - Virtual education is an important imperative for the necessary bridging of Croatian technological “backwardness”
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
